The European Union's response to the war in Ukraine covers specific needs of the people, state, armed forces, and economy.

Together, we are resilient



Macro-financial assistance

Alleviating the finacial pressure on the Ukrainian state, so that it can continue priority expenditures such assalaries and pensions, security, business support, reconstruction services, and support to energy, transport and education projects

- €4.2 billion of urgent macro-financial assistance provided (March October) and a further €3 billion in macro-financial assistance set to be disbursed this year
- _ €500 million in budget support provided as part of the pledges from the Stand up for Ukraine and the highlevel international donors conference



Emergency socio-economic programme:

Access to education, medicine and food, support for local authorities, businesses, and civil society, energy and cyber security, and reconstruction

- €330 million allocated to support internally displaced persons and local communities, as well as enterprises, agriculture, infrastructure and other vital areas, to ensure socio-economic resilience
- Support to digital services allowing citizens to inform the government through Diia about property damage, a governmental service and simplified compensation, transformation of civic initiative "Prykhystok" into for hosts of IDPs with help of EU-supported BRDO

Helping Ukraine to remain stable and fully functioning



Targeted funds and other instruments:

Support to the economy and trade, individual businesses, export capacity

- Customs duties on the import of Ukrainian goods to the EU cancelled for **one year** in early June
- €1 billion investment by the EBRD, partly guaranteed by the EU, to support Ukrainian companies providing vital services for the population
- **€20 million** allocated by the European Commission to support at least 200 high-tech Ukrainian start-ups
- Around 15 million tonnes of cereals and oilseed products exported by Ukraine (as of November 2022) thanks to the Solidarity Lanes
- €1.2 million in grants for 300 most vulnerable smallbusinesses, procurement of equipment to help SMEsrelaunch production
- Easier business environment via EU-supported BRDO: development of legislation to simplify opening, moving, and running a business at war



Direct budget support:

needs of critical infrastructure, recovery after the destruction, support to the population and agricultural production, other current expenditures of the state

- **€120 million** of grant funds in 2022 that do not need to bepaid back
- €500 million of additional budget support grant funds
 - €2.2 billion transferred to the Ukrainian budget by theEuropean Investment Bank











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Together, we care



Support with safety:

Employment, social and medical assistance for refugees in the EU

- 7.5 million received the novel temporary protectionstatus in the EU
- **@1 billion** donated by the European Commission during the 'Stand Up for Ukraine' donor conference
- **€3.5 billion** allocated by the European Commission to EU Member States to host Ukrainians
- An EU Temporary Protection Directive provides rights and access to residency, housing, social and medical assistance, as well as care of unaccompanied children and adolescents, education, and ljobs¹
 - ¹ in line with the policy of the EU Member States on the labour market



Emergency aid through the EU Civil Protection Mechanism (CPM):

Medicine and medical equipment, first-aid kits, ambulances, food, shelters, power generators, food, shelter, IT equipment, protective gear and heavy machinery

- Delivery of aid to Ukraine in the largest and most complex EU CPM operation ever (worth €523 million)
- Support provided by all 27 EU countries, as well as Norway, Turkey, North Macedonia and the European Commission's 'RescEU' reserve stockpiles
- Over **77,000 tonnes** of material aid sent to Ukraine
- Over 1100 patients in need of medical care sent to hospitals in the EU and Norway

Helping Ukrainians to be safe and secure



Urgent humanitarian aid for those affected:

Food, water, medicine, shelter, cash

- **€523 million** allocated for the primary needs of people affected by the war (including € 38 million for Moldova to support Ukrainian refugees)
- More than **13 million** people in Ukraine received humanitarian aid with the EU's contribution from the start of full-scale invasion:
 - 8.9 million people received food and livelihood assistance
 - **8.6 million** people received health interventions and medical supplies
 - More than **3. 9 million** people received cash assistance (UAH 2 200) for the purchase of the most necessary goods
 - Over 6.4 million p eople were assisted with critical protection services
 - Over 5.7 million people received access to clean water and critical hygiene and sanitation services







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Weapons, equipment, and ammunition:

€8 billion on military support have already been provided to Ukraine by the European Union and the Member States:

- Marks the first time the EU has financed the supply of lethal weapon in this way
- €5 billion in military equipment have already been provided to Ukraine by the European Union Member States



Security assistance from EU projects:

Bulletproof vests, first-aid kits, transport, various devices and software

€200 million from the budgets of active EU-funded projects in Ukraine redirected to cover urgent needs in various areas, particularly law enforcement agencies (e.g. Ministry of Internal Affairs, National Police, Prosecutor General's Office, Ministry of Justice), including:

- over €8 million worth of equipment (vehicles, radios, IT equipment, uniforms, personal protective equipment, first aid kits, etc.) was donated to Ukrainian law enforcement agencies via the EU-funded PRAVO Police Programme
- about €1.6 million was re-purposed by the EU Advisory Mission for support package to law enforcement agencies to buy first aid kits, food rations and communication equipment
- **6 600 items** of emergency aid worth €4 million delivered by the EU Anti-Corruption Initiative
- 1460 items of emergency aid provided by the EU Pravo-Justice Programme
